

Believer's Baptism

- Baptism is an outward expression of an internal choice to follow Jesus
- Matthew 28:18-20 says to make disciples before it says to baptize
- Follows the pattern in the book of Acts (see Acts 2:38; 8:12, 36-38; 9:18; 10:44-48; 16:13-15, 32-34; 18:8)

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.

Infant Baptism

 Baptism is a sign of inclusion in the covenant community and of belief And I will establish my covenant between me and you AND YOUR OFFSPRING after you throughout their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you.

Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you AND FOR YOUR CHILDREN and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself.

Infant Baptism

- Baptism is a sign of inclusion in the covenant community and of belief
- God gives covenant signs to the children of His people throughout the Bible
- Baptism and circumcision are both external signs that point to internal spiritual realities (Deut. 10:16; Rom. 6:3-5)


In him also you were circumcised with a circumcision made without hands, by putting off the body of the flesh, by the circumcision of Christ, having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through faith in the powerful working of God, who raised him from the dead.

Infant Baptism

- Great Commission is for missionary context, not for children of believers
- Pattern of belief then baptism in Acts always happens in a missionary context
- Household baptisms (Acts 16:13-15, 32-34;
 1 Cor. 1:16) may have included children too young to believe for themselves


Where Do We Go From Here?

- NOT SAYING baptism is unimportant
- ARE SAYING unity in Christ is more important than disagreements on infant baptism

- ARE SAYING God wants us to prioritize loving one another over whether or not we baptize babies
