## Sources of Self

- Lazarus has a name, but the rich man doesn't
- The rich man has built his life around things that don't last
- There is no lasting identity that's not built on God
- Is there a you at the core that remains after all the things of the world are taken away?

Luke 16:19-31

## Eternal Outcomes

- The rich man wasn't consciously rejecting God during his life - he thought he was obeying
- If we live forever, the trajectory we set in our lives will continue into eternity
"It is not a question of God 'sending us' to hell. In each of us there is something growing, which will be Hell unless it is nipped in the bud."


## Eternal Outcomes

- The rich man wasn't consciously rejecting God during his life - he thought he was obeying
- If we live forever, the trajectory we set in our lives will continue into eternity
- The rich man would rather spend eternity in hell with his pride intact than humble himself and have a chance to experience heaven


## Earthly Outcomes

- Being a Christian is about having a new identity
- Having a false self leads to ways of living that fail to love others or that harm them
- An identity built on God leads to right living
- On the cross, Jesus bore the horrors of hell so we don't have to
- People becoming more like Jesus will endure suffering in order to help others


## Earthly Outcomes

- The blessing of being a Christian is such a secure identity that you'd still be content and joyful, even if you were experiencing hell all around you
- There's nothing we can do in our own power to transform ourselves in this way
